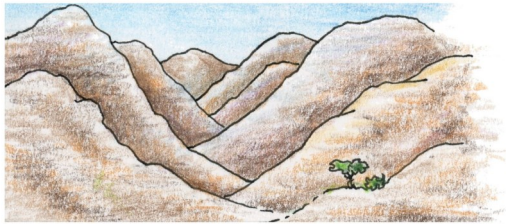

A letter from our Vicar, Revd Phillip Johnson



We find ourselves in a new year and hopefully by now we've got through January which seems to have about 43 days... Most of the lead up to Christmas involved either leading and providing all of the services combined with planning everything for 2025. As the Parish gets bigger and more activities and events take place the need for planning itself becomes bigger and more complex. This year we are launching our inaugural Arts Festival in June and we are running even more courses and open events than in previous years.

The danger is that we start to think that success is found in the busyness of activity – that the busier we are the more important our work must be. However, the Bible spends a lot of time reminding us that God is not found in the loud and extravagant moments but mostly in the silence. This paradoxical statement has troubled humans ever since it was written. We have a tendency to associate activity with achievement whereas God is present in everything including stillness and silence.

When church buildings are built they often have a large main worship space but a lot of them also have small side chapels. It's been said that churches need to have spaces for celebration but also for weeping. In our Lady Chapel at the moment we have a series of paintings by Vicki Heath – a number of people have found this space to be one in which they can just sit and be. The church is open every day and everyone is welcome to come and use that space to be silent, to reflect and to pray.

I hope you enjoy the programme of events that we have planned this Spring leading up to Easter but that you also find some time to just be and enjoy the silence.

They should “discover your world in their own way”. Young children have a great capacity for wonder. They are learning what the world is all about. 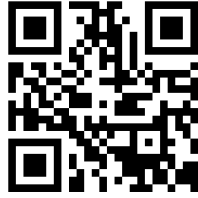

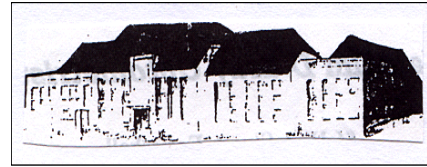

It was a poignant moment at St Chad's on 24th November when Warden John Treanor presented Revd Phillip Johnson with a gift on behalf of the congregation to celebrate his first year in Eccleshall Parish. John thanked him for his great enthusiasm, his inspirational sermons and all the hard work he had put in to make it such a successful twelve months. Phillip told us how well he has settled in to life here and how welcoming the community is.



A fabulous forest of pine trees twinkled, flashed and sparkled at Holy Trinity from the evening of Thursday 28th November to the end of Sunday 1st December for the annual Christmas Tree Festival. St Chad's parishioners decorated our own tree with hand-made ornaments depicting the story of our Patron Saint with

his Celtic crosses. This time there were 67 trees adorning the church interior, a magnificent record.

Advent began on Sunday 1st December when Revd Phillip lit the first of the five candles of the Advent wreath, purple to represent hope. This he said was a time of waiting and hope for the birth of the Christ Child.

Decorations, delightful playing from the Ensemble and organist and the amazing Bible stories surrounding Christ's birth made St Chad's Service of Lessons and Carols a very special occasion on 15th December. Warden John welcomed a full congregation of three generations. He thanked the flower arrangers for seasonal foliage by the

A promise of heavy rain all evening did not discourage 12 carol singers on 18th December to call on villagers and local households giving some festive cheer and Christmas joy. The evening ended with a buffet supper hosted by Andy and Sue Bramall. An incredible sum of £300 was collected during the event.

Our elder son Matt, his wife Simi and their three children Arushi 17, Millen 15 and Eashan 13 stayed with us over Christmas and helped to make our Christmas Day Service especially memorable. Arushi joined Grandpa John to read the two lessons, Eashan rang the bell (74 for eucharist!) and Millen was sidesman handing out books to everyone as they came in. At the beginning of the service the fifth candle, the central white one in the Advent wreath, was lit by Revd Phillip. This candle represents the Light of Christ.

A Brewing Sense of Purpose

I searched the internet for the word 'vocation'. The first result was Vocation Brewery (other breweries are available!) It's a business that I had never heard of but it immediately piqued my interest as I have been known to sample a few real ales in my time: in particular the company's tag line - Craftsmanship, Innovation & Patience Combine to Create Masterpieces. Further intrigued I then discovered that the brewery came into being when its founder 'left his job to follow his calling – to brew the big, flavourful beers he loves'.

Vocation is a word used often to describe a call for those who work in what we might describe as the caring professions – medicine and teaching amongst them and in the church we use it often for those who follow a call to ordination. At its heart though vocation is doing the thing that God wants us to do which brings us joy and means that we might have something of life in all its fullness (John 10:10). In my work in supporting lay and ordained vocations I often describe it as the divine nigggle, the thing that you just can't let go of however much you might try.

I don't know if the founder of Vocation Brewery has a faith but it seems he understands vocation. In the Christian tradition the Craftsmanship that we have is given to us by God as a gift and honed and shaped by learning and practice as we develop. Being open to the ways that God might be working in our lives and the lives of others brings about new ways of seeing the world and new ways of being (innovation). Patience means that we work at God's pace rather than our own which can at times be hugely frustrating! These things combined mean that we might become or create 'masterpieces' within our own spheres of work whether within the church or beyond. Each of us has a vocation and our vocations are used in God's service and for the good of our communities. Again perhaps the website sums it up well: in the 'About us' section there is a tale of overcoming obstacles to create the business and the final sentence reads 'we pride ourselves on working together with shared purpose, on shared triumphs over adversities, born out of a love of what we do'.

There is real joy in doing what we love and so often people think that God is going to ask us to do the thing that we really dread or feel totally unqualified to do. It can take a huge leap of faith to follow a call and fulfil

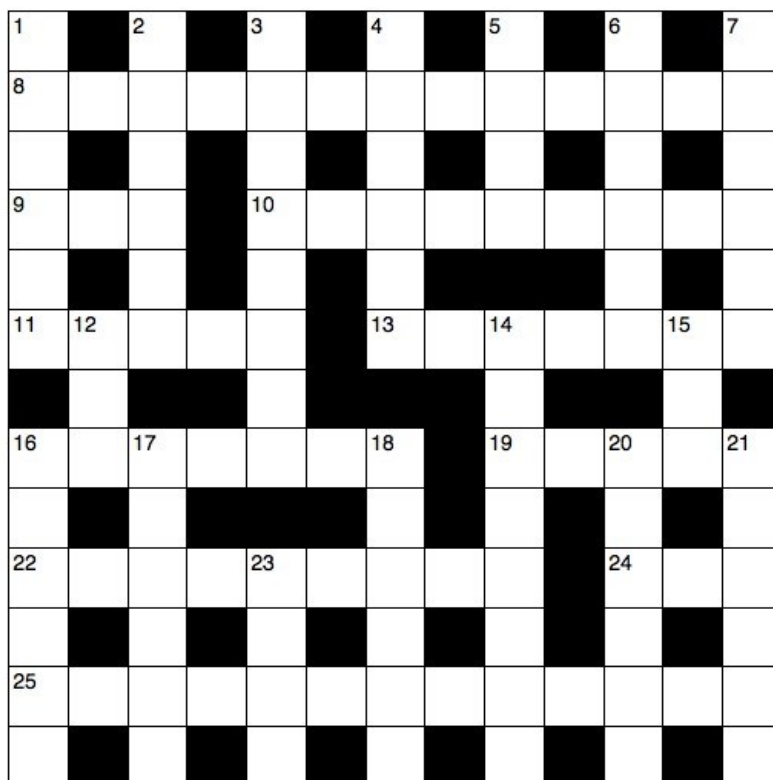

Butterflies in Eccleshall 2024

2024 has been a dreadful year for butterflies not just in Eccleshall but throughout the United Kingdom which is causing concern for environmentalists and in particular Butterfly Conservation.

One of the results of this was that no sightings were recorded for Common Blue or Small Copper butterflies all Summer whilst also no Brown Argus butterflies were seen but they are not recorded every year anyhow. No one knows exactly why this is but much of the blame is laid at the feet of the very wet winter and spring followed by a poor summer. It is quite possible that many winter habitats were washed out with flooding from well above normal rainfall meaning the loss of species at various stages of their development. Farmers' pesticides are also blamed but why should they have been so much worse this year?

A couple of statistics indicate how bad things have been. In 2023, although that was not a good year, on the best day (26th July) 369 different butterflies were recorded whilst the best day in 2024 was 11th August when just 83 butterflies were noted. The other statistic relates to the Small Tortoiseshell which has been in decline over the past year or two. Periodic counts have been undertaken by Warren Griffiths in the tower of Holy Trinity Church and some of these, when taken in winter, enable one to record the number of butterflies hibernating. In November 2021 110 of the species were recorded; this dropped in November 2022 to 24 and in November 2024 Warren recorded just 3 examples of the butterfly.

So many species struggled this year. After a good year for "field" butterflies in 2023, Ringlet, Meadow Brown and Small Skipper all struggled whilst Gate Keeper, which had been showing signs of recovery after the building of Sancerre Grange Estate, saw less than half the 2023 numbers. The Speckled Wood did manage an average number of sightings.

The coloured butterflies that we love to see in our gardens did not prosper too well. The Peacock actually was better than 2023 but was down on the previous four years; the Red Admiral was exceptional in 2023 and this year we recorded less than half of that year's sightings, but it was one of the few species to perform better than average. The Painted Lady is an immigrant butterfly and this was a very bad year with no more than one seen on any particular day. The Comma had a reasonable Autumn but was

well down on the previous year.

The Large White is largely an immigrant butterfly and sightings were well down on the last three years; the Small White had its worst showing since 2016 and the Green Veined White had the worst year since we moved into Eccleshall 20 years ago! The Whites are the most visible of our butterflies, so it is no wonder that so many people offered me comments on how few butterflies there were this year.

The only other butterflies noted were Brimstone which are fairly uncommon locally and the Spring butterfly, Orange Tip, which equalled the worst year since 2007.

This commentary illustrates what a disappointing year 2024 has been for butterflies and we can only hope that 2025 will be better. On a brighter note, sightings in September and October were up to average whereas all the earlier months in the year were all worse than normal. Unfortunately, this trend was not continued in November 2024 where we were virtually sunless for the first 10 days followed shortly afterwards by some sharp frosts. No butterflies at all were recorded in that month.

The Importance of History

Do you know Repton? I drove through it and was impressed by the sight of its elegant church. "Repton" sounded familiar.... and yet it wasn't so I looked into it.

Repton is a village and civil parish in South Derbyshire located on the edge of the River Trent floodplain about 5 miles north of Swadlincote. The village's recorded name changed from Hreopandune in the Anglo Saxon Chronicle to Rapendune in the Domesday Book and then to Repingdon

before becoming Repton. From the 7th to the 9th century, Repton was a principal residence of the Mercian royal family; Paeda, a son of the early Mercian king Penda, received Christian teaching and was baptized in 653 AD, the village cross marking the spot. Three years later the first bishop of Mercia, Diuma, introduced Christianity to the kingdom at Repton.

Repton Abbey, an Anglo-Saxon Benedictine abbey, was founded in the 7th century. The abbey was a double monastery - a community of both monks and nuns and headed by an abbess. The first abbess is recorded as being Saint Werburgh who died in 699. She was a daughter of Wulfhere, King of Mercia and Saint Ermelida. The abbey is noted for its connections to various saints and Mercian royalty; two of the thirty-seven Mercian Kings were buried within the abbey's crypt.

When those early Saxons erected their simple timber and mud-walled church in the 7th century, it began a thousand years of building, giving us one of the most noble of village shrines. They gave us a crypt which grew in fame until it became the northern equivalent of Westminster Abbey. Beginning with King Æthelbald (AD716-757) it became the final resting place of Mercian kings and queens including King Wiglaf and his grandson, martyred Prince Wystan, who was murdered in AD849. For many years the crypt beneath the church sheltered the remains of the martyred prince who had been treacherously murdered by his cousin but his remains were transferred to Evesham on the approach of invading Vikings. By this time Wystan had been made a saint and his shrine a place of pilgrimage. Such was the popularity of a pilgrimage to St Wystan's Repton tomb that the crypt was regularly dangerously overcrowded by devout pilgrims. As a result an extra set of stairs was made creating an early example of a one-way system which stands to this day.

In the autumn of 873 the Viking Great Heathen Army reached Repton, establishing winter quarters there before completing their conquest of Mercia in 874. The monks and nuns were left with no choice but to flee taking the remains of Saint Wystan with them. The Army looted and destroyed the abbey and built a fortified encampment in the grounds between the abbey church and the River Trent. When the Vikings

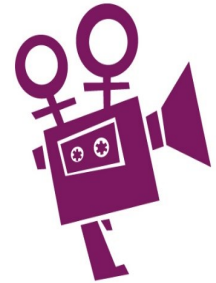

departed they had destroyed the abbey buildings, many of which were made of wood and set fire to the abbey church. The abbey church was partially restored approximately 40 to 50 years later serving as a parish church rather than an abbey. In the 12th century the newly formed Repton Priory was established a short distance away and was rebuilt and enlarged between the 13th and 15th centuries. It has been suggested that the crypt at Repton later influenced the design of both the spiral-columned shrine of Edward the Confessor and the Coronation Pavement in Westminster Abbey, both commissioned by Henry III, based on the similarity of their dimensions and design.

What struck me was that this history is relevant to all our local church communities as at that time there was only one Christian church. This was before King Henry VIII split from the Catholic Church and the Church of England was formed and before Wesley's followers split from the Anglican Church and the Methodist Church was formed. Repton's history is our history. My interest was rekindled by a book gifted at Christmas, "I Never Knew That About England's Country Churches" by Christopher Winn. Winn states that, "Repton speaks to us from before the dawn of England... a cradle of Christianity...the oldest unaltered place of Christian worship in England, a tiny exquisite crypt..." This book looks at churches arranged by County and, in Staffordshire, is mention of Ingestre, Ashley and Maer, Izaak Walton, Josiah Wedgwood and Charles Darwin. All our churches have a history which links us to individual people of the past as well our nation's Christian story. The beautiful church we see in Repton today is nothing like the first little wooden place of worship built there in the 7th century but one led to the other and tell us of our country's, and religion's, history. If our forebears hadn't built our wonderful, varied churches, we wouldn't be worshipping here in Eccleshall today and future generations will rely on us to tell their stories.

To the uninitiated lichens can look broadly similar to subtle mosaics of colour, often greys and yellows forming expanding circles as they increase in size as the years go by. There is more to lichens than meets the eye however. Firstly they are two or more organisms living together as one, usually a fungus and an algae. Fungus forms the visible part of the lichen and within, protected by threads of the fungus, are cells of algae and/or cyanobacteria which photosynthesise. So the fungus provides a home and the algae provides food. Lichens reproduce through microscopic fungal spores which, if they find a suitable partner, can colonise surfaces which are not too shaded or too smooth. These spores are released from structures which look rather like tiny jam tarts, flasks or pimples!

Lichens are fantastic at surviving where other life cannot. Provided there is enough light and moisture lichens are able to grow on bare stone, not needing cracks or soil to root into. Some lichens grow very slowly, perhaps half a millimetre per year whilst others grow more quickly. Many lichens are long-lived so the lichen you see in a churchyard may be almost as old as the wall or gravestone it is growing on. Astonishingly there are over 2,000 different lichen species and it is not unusual for a single churchyard to contain more than 100 different types.

Churchyards are particularly rich in lichens as they contain so many old stones with a variety of types; limestone, sandstone, granite to name a few. Some stones are smoother, others rough and they may have differing amounts of shade, wind and moisture depending on where they are within the churchyard, which side of the monument the lichen is on, whether they are vertical, leaning or flat. The carving of the inscription itself provides microclimates with different amounts of light and moisture within the lettering. All of these changes in conditions will suit different lichen species. They are also found on trees, wooden fences and gates, grassy areas, pathways and even dustbin lids!

Most lichens offer protection to the surface they grow on and it may be easier to read lettering which is lichen-covered rather than bare, eroding stone. They do not need much care but do avoid the use of any chemicals near to lichens and definitely don't try and remove them. Lichens can die if shaded out so try and keep ivy or other climbers from encroaching over them too.

If you have never taken a closer look at a lichen then why not take a hand-lens or magnifying glass and give it a go. Lichen colonies have been

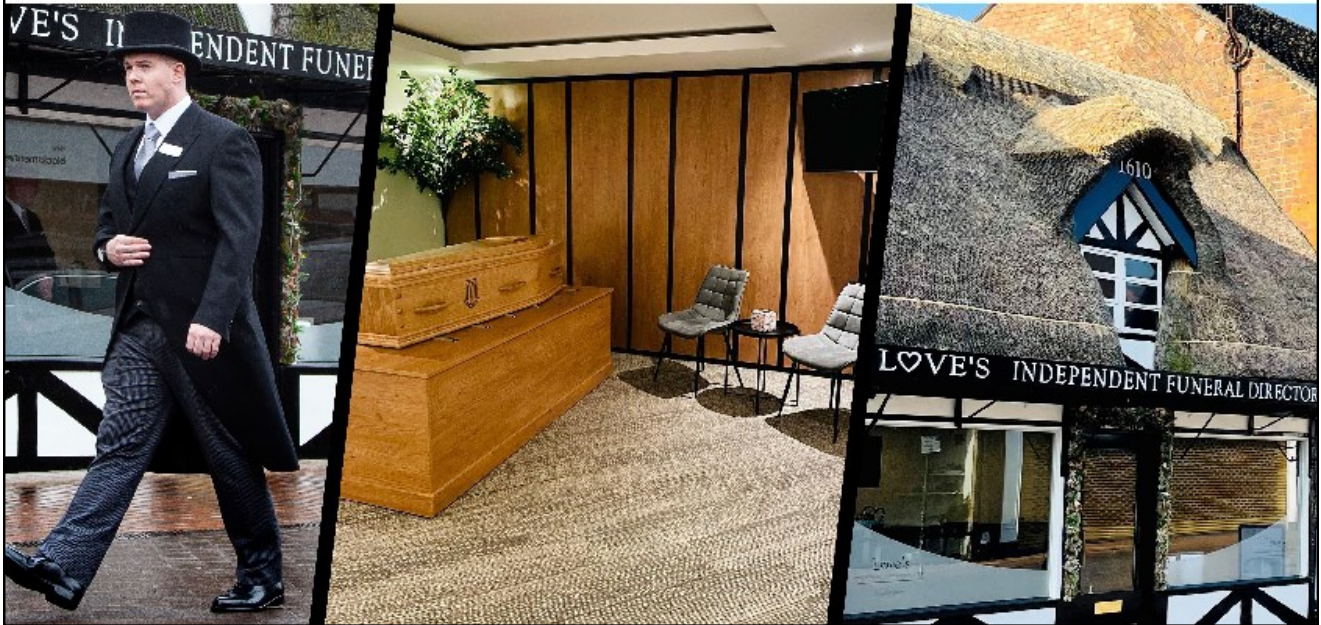

described as minute, self-maintaining gardens providing a natural cladding for the stone. They are beautiful and endlessly fascinating and if you like a challenge why not look up the British Lichen Society website and find out more about how to identify them.

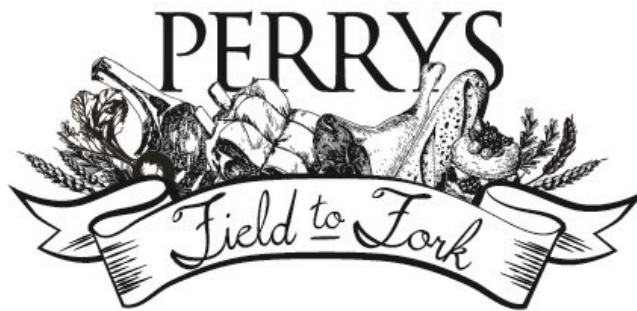

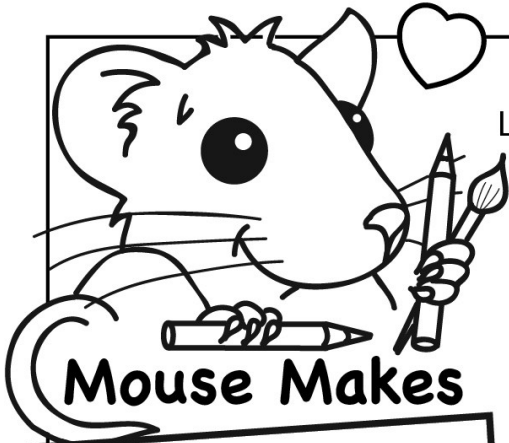

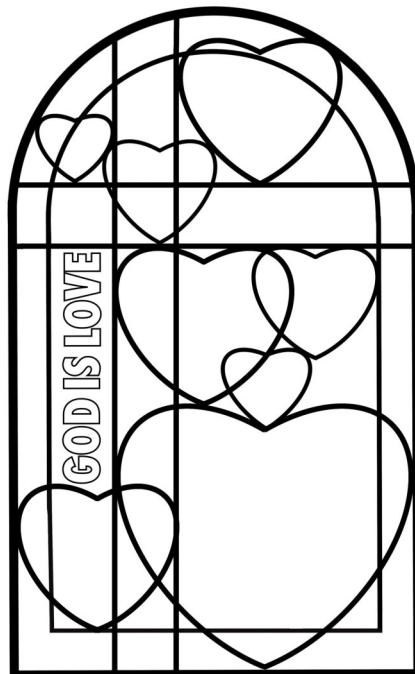
