### A letter from our Vicar, Revd Phillip Johnson



Well, we've reached the end of another year. At the time of writing we're preparing for the 6th Annual Christmas Tree Festival. This, along with Remembrance, Christmas Eve and Easter, is one of the busiest times at Holy Trinity.

When I was a teacher this shift used to mark the downhill ski slope to Christmas. Even though it was dark (in the mornings and the evenings - and usually in between as well) there was mounting excitement about the impending season of goodwill. People seemed to just become a bit nicer and there seemed to be a general consensus that this would be a good time for peace to break out.

Interestingly the Church deals with this in some surprising ways. Christmas is preceded by the season of Advent. This season has four main themes - death, judgement, heaven and hell. These are surprising themes because when you think about Christmas, which seems so jolly, they seem incredibly dark. Yet the whole point of the season of advent is one of preparation. It's a season that explores the coming of the light in an extremely dark period. Advent took on its own identity in northern Europe, as we are plunged Into Darkness once the clocks go back.

This year we're marking the season with a special Advent Carol Service. The Service begins in darkness and, after each reading, a set of candles is lit in the church. This increases the light, a gentle reminder that the light of the world will be coming at Christmas. It is a partner service to Tenebrae in Holy Week which begins in the light and finishes in the dark. The church year begins anew on Advent Sunday and so, in church, we get two opportunities to make New Year's resolutions. I think two opportunities to seek peace and goodwill for all people are never a bad idea. I pray that you, your families and all those whom you love have a

### Prayer for the Month

O God our Father,

give to us, and to all who use the roads – to drive, to ride or to walk –

consideration and care for all others;

that death and injury may be caused to no one, and that all who travel may go in safety, peace and joy;

through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.

Frank Best, in "Prayers for Today's Church"

I don't suppose we often pray for those who use the roads. But here is a prayer for all road users – on wheels or on foot.

I sometimes sit on the iron seat by the Castle Street crossroads and observe those negotiating the busy mini-roundabout. It is a hazardous area for drivers, particularly those turning left or right, and especially when huge lorries are trying to ease their way round. Even the best drivers have to take extra care in those hazardous circumstances and pedestrians likewise.

This prayer invites us to remember all road users that they may proceed safely and responsibly — "that death and injury may be caused to no one". It asks that they may show two particular virtues. First, consideration for others. Sometimes, if it isn't clear who has right of way, there has to be some give and take. A considerate driver will use discretion and courtesy when approaching such a situation. Sadly, at that crossroads, you sometimes see impulsive motorists who push their way through with little thought for others. Secondly, the prayer urges the avoidance of recklessness. Through my front window I observe a good number of motorists, on two wheels and four, travelling at a speed which would inevitably cause accident or death if an unexpected emergency arose. The prayer is asking God to help us drive in a careful and vigilant way that avoids risk and injury.

I would add a third virtue to the two in this prayer: that of patience. It is a difficult virtue to practice if we are in a hurry. But impatience can lead to lack of judgement. So we ask God to help road users to remain calm when under pressure. In this month's prayer, are we interceding for others or for ourselves? Probably both!

### St Chad's News

The wild flower areas have now been mown after the yellow rattle successfully supressed the grass especially round the yew tree near the west window. They made a colourful splash earlier in the summer.

For some time there has been a problem with the gates to the churchyard which have been out of line and difficult to close. The oak posts either side were found to be rotten below ground level and had to be replaced. Now the gates fit perfectly and they are a pleasure to shut

properly.

# One Candidate's Confirmation Journey

My confirmation journey started around a year ago. I'd had a tough few years personally, hadn't really been attending church regularly for quite some time, hadn't been praying regularly and I wanted to work on my relationship with God.

I met with Reverend Phillip a couple of times towards the back end of 2023, started attending services as often as I could and around the spring of this year started to think about how I could show my commitment to God and take the next step of my journey. I was never confirmed as a child and I think that was the way it was meant to be for me. I don't think 'teenage Greg' would have been ready or known enough about himself or his relationship with God to make the commitment as meaningfully as the grown up (questionable..?!) version.

At the age of 44 I did wonder if it would feel awkward getting confirmed but it really didn't. I had a mental image of what confirmation classes would be like – perhaps shaped by my fairly negative experiences of Sunday school in the late 1980s! Thankfully it was nothing like this, I met with Rev Phillip once a week and we literally talked. I was able to ask questions about everything and anything to do with faith, services, traditions, etc etc....

The day of the service itself was absolutely lovely. Bishop Matthew attended and we were all able to spend time talking with him before the

# Godly Play

Our Children's and Families Minister, Cassie, has recently completed her Godly Play qualification at Rippon College in Cuddesdon demonstrating her expertise in this area.

Godly Play is a Christian movement centred on childhood spirituality. It begins with children's innate sense of the presence of God. It offers Christian language as a support for their ongoing spiritual formation. It teaches a process that promotes an inner working model for life-long Christian learning.

Through storytelling, we then ask a series of open-ended questions starting with the phrase 'I wonder......' that encourage both young and old listeners to explore the theme or text uniquely. There are no right or wrong answers and no judgement or explanations are needed. This non-judgemental approach is a brilliant way to learn about biblical themes and scriptures.

Revd Phillip and Cassie currently conduct short sessions with both reception classes at Bishop Lonsdale CofE Academy and we are delighted to report that they are being received with great enthusiasm and positivity.



# Christmas decorations

Prince Albert, husband of Queen Victoria, is often credited for making Christmas trees fashionable in Britain but the tradition of decorations and of bringing greenery into our houses and places of worship is far older than that. There are records of decorations for Saturnalia in ancient descriptions from the 5<sup>th</sup> century BC. Saturnalia fell in mid-December, around the time of the solstice, which is of course when Christmas falls. Decorating trees is also an ancient Celtic custom. A tree would be decorated at the winter solstice as a symbol of life and the Scandinavians did so to celebrate Yule, also a mid-winter festival.

Celtic tree dressing was not solely associated with the solstice. Piny the Elder describes a festival on the 6<sup>th</sup> day of the moon which involved sacred oak trees. Ash, apple, hazel alder and elder all have particular importance. Oak, ash and thorn are the three primary 'magical' trees, employed by Puck, in Rudyard Kipling's Puck of Pooks Hill to transport the children back

through time. Yew features in many traditions and beliefs as a symbol of both death and life. Yew boughs, along with holly, were brought indoors to decorate homes and churches for Christmas, probably because of their evergreen foliage and red berries.


Decorating churches and homes for Christmas has been part of the church calendar for many centuries with almost all surviving church records from the late Middle Ages including entries for purchasing holly and ivy. The Christmas carol *Deck the Halls with Boughs of Holly* dates from 16<sup>th</sup> century Wales. It was Prince Albert who popularised the use of spruce trees however, not a British tree species and imported from his native Coburg in Germany. Periodicals such as the Illustrated London News began to describe the royal Christmas tree each year and the custom took off amongst the public. Wreaths hung on the door also became popular during Victorian times although, like decorations and the use of greenery, wreaths were not new, having been presented in Ancient Rome as a reward for military success and excellence. Advent wreaths may have originated amongst Lutherans in 16<sup>th</sup> century Germany.

Kissing boughs are an old tradition now lost, but which may have led to the custom of kissing beneath the mistletoe. Kissing boughs consisted of a hoop of pliable sticks, probably hazel or willow, made into a sphere on which decorative greenery could be fixed. These would be hung on walls or in doorways to welcome people into the building and could be quite large. Popular in Tudor times, they became more elaborate in Georgian times and included apples, oranges and coloured paper or baubles. Gentlemen could pluck a berry and then kiss a lady on the cheek until the berries ran out and the kissing stopped!

Most of our churchyards and cemeteries contain a ready supply of the greenery traditionally used for decoration; holly, ivy, yew and sometimes mistletoe too. A small contribution towards more sustainable ways could be to increase use of these natural 'decorations' and reduce the need for imported flowers or artificial baubles and lights. You will be following in the footsteps of many generations celebrating both Christmas and the solstice with the hope in a dark season that both bring.

# Remembrance Sunday at Holy Trinity

We always expect a good number of people in the congregation at Holy Trinity on Remembrance Sunday and this year was no exception. Revd Phillip, in his sermon, spoke about the importance of memories - how some childhood memories made him extraordinarily happy and how a song heard on the radio can evoke precious memories. He referred to how

someone struggling to speak, due to e.g. dementia, can join in with a song from the past or will chime in with the Lord's Prayer - moving something deep within them. Memories have an extraordinary ability to take us out of the present moment and pass back to a moment in time, to make something seem alive again.

Phillip referred to how, on All Souls' Day, we remember those personal to us who have died. A few days later, on Remembrance Sunday, we have collective remembering when we remember those who gave their lives in defence of our country. He told us that the Royal British Legion annual Act of Remembrance which takes place in the Royal Albert Hall and is broadcast on the BBC, is the third most watched TV programme every year. Phillip reminded us how fortunate we were to be able to worship together and remember the fallen and those who serve - in a number of countries this would be illegal. Referring to one of the readings of the day, from the book of Jonah, Phillip pointed out that those who go to war go, not because it's something they want to do but because it's something that needs to be done.



So Phillip asked what were we doing in this service when we remembered. He suggested that, when we heard the names of the fallen whose names are inscribed on the War Memorial, we should bring those people back, present with us in our minds. He asked us to also remember those who are dear to us, those who are no longer with us. He asked us to remember that we are just journeying through this place and we have been given a gift. That gift is the ability to remember and to bring those people back to life in our memories.

The congregation was led outside by the Holy



Trinity Choir and flag-bearers from Eccleshall branches of the Royal British Legion, Scouts, Cubs and Beavers. Several minutes passed as we waited for the moment of the Act of Remembrance at the War Memorial. This time was peaceful in our beautiful surroundings - listening to bird song and appreciating the freedom that we have in our country. The Last Post, played by bugler, Kate Newby, a member of Eccleshall Royal British Legion, indicated the start of the two minutes silence. Those in the churchyard and those on the road-sides stood in the quiet to remember the sacrifices of our armed forces and all those whose lives have been lost in conflict.





## Bishop Lonsdale Academy Remembers

The Principal, Deputy-Principal and two pupils represented the Academy at the Remembrance Sunday Service at Holy Trinity, laying a wreath at the War Memorial. The following day, Armistice Day, all the pupils gathered together in school for an act of worship and commemoration. Pupils led the service which opened with the whole school singing the song 'Remember' by Emily Barden, ably accompanied by Father (as he is known in the school) Phillip on the piano. Various year groups reminded everyone of the sacrifice of those involved in war and why we should remember. Prayers were followed by the National Anthem. The minute's silence at 11 am was signalled both by a 'live streamed' Big Ben and by one of the pupils blowing a whistle. Wreaths were laid at the Academy's model cenotaph, following traditional words of commendation. The Nursery children then waved us goodbye before individual pupils and staff came forward to talk about their or their family's involvement in the armed services, past and present. A salutary experience for all.

### God's Wonderful Diverse World

Advent calendars usually have 25 numbered windows and we open the first one on the first of December, but really Advent often begins in late November, four Sundays before



Christmas Day. This year that Sunday falls on 1st December so Advent really does run just 25 days through December, up to Christmas Day. Advent is our period of preparation and reflection. We centre on the greatest gift of all time, God's gift of His Son to us. God's sacrifice of His Son for our sin .... but we tend not to think so much about that second aspect till Easter! I'm thinking about December, it's history and what it means to people through history and around the world.

December's name derives from the Latin word decem, meaning ten, because it was originally the tenth month of the year in the calendar of Romulus, c.750 BC, which began in March. The winter days following December were not included in the ten months. Later, the months of January and February were created and added to the beginning of the calendar rather than the end, but December retained its name.

The Anglo Saxons referred to December to January as Ġēolamonaþ, in modern English: "Yule month". Yule is one of the oldest winter solstice festivals, with origins among the ancient Norse, thousands of years ago, as a Norse festival called jol, with themes of light, fire, and feasting to allay the fears of the cold, dark season.

December is noted for its many Meteor showers but it also has an amazing array of "special" titles. In the USA it is National Egg Nog Month, National Impaired Driving Prevention Month, National Fruit Cake Month and National Pear Month!

Special days indicated on my calendar are 2nd - St Andrew's Day, 21st - December Solstice, 24th - Christmas Eve, 25th - Christmas Day, and 26th - First Day of Hanukkah. Not noted are these special days from around the world: First Friday is Farmer's day in Ghana, and Gospel Day in the Marshall Islands. First Sunday is Good Neighbourliness Day in Turkmenistan, and Sindhi Cultural Day in Sindhi communities. Second Monday is National Tree Planting Day in Malawi. December 26th is Day of Good Will in Namibia and South Africa, Family Day in Vanuatu, and Thanksgiving in the Solomon Islands. And while we celebrate Christmas Day on 25th it is Children's day in several African countries, Constitution

# A Gospel of Songs

It's Advent! Christmas and New Year are on the horizon – but for the church a new year has just started. The next twelve months at church will be full of readings from Luke's Gospel.

For me, especially at this time of year, Luke's is the gospel of songs. The three great 'songs' – the Benedictus (Luke 1.68-79), the Magnificat (Luke 1.46-55) and the Nunc Dimittis (Luke 2.29-32) all appear early in Luke's gospel.

Each is a song of God's promise fulfilled. In them, Zechariah, Mary and then Simeon each speak about what they long for and see coming. The songs are personal and prophetic, all at once! They are songs of freedom, release, and the coming ('advent') of God's kingdom. They demonstrate a sense of joy that God is taking the burden of sin off humanity.

Tell Out My Soul! written, in 1962 by Timothy Dudley-Smith, wonderfully captures this spirit through its reworking of the words of the Magnificat.

Each of these songs is used every day in formal Church of England worship. The Benedictus is the climax of Morning Prayer. The Magnificat appears in Evening Prayer and the much shorter Nunc Dimittis summarises our night prayer. In Daily Office we usually speak them rather than sing them, but even so they flow with their own rhythm and sound. They anchor us and tell our story — a bit like saying the creed together on Sunday morning.

If you are lucky enough to regularly attend daily offices you will know the power of these three songs. They will have seeped into your soul and you probably almost know them off by heart! Different words will emerge into your mind at different times of day or moments in life.

If you can't attend the daily office you could join one online (perhaps Lichfield Cathedral, which streams Morning Prayer six days a week).

Or why not read one of these three songs regularly at your time of prayer? You will be praying them alongside thousands of others each day. They will refresh you and remind you of your faith. As you speak them, they will become a way of expressing your Christian desire for the 'advent' of God's Kingdom. It's a desire which you share with me, and with millions of other praying Christians today and every day.

### The Latest Buzz

Autumn/Winter has come round again. In September you were promised more details of preparing bees for the winter months so here goes......

It starts in September when I harvested the last of the honey the bees could spare. No honey is taken from their nest – the brood box. The honey in the frames was very heavy and our chief beekeeper is still away sailing and so perhaps you can imagine how happy I was that day!! However the honey tasted glorious.

When the honey has been spun out of the frames the empty frames are put back in the hives. Bees are amazing - those bees on domestic duties get to work & clean the frames ready for them to be taken off the hives and stored until needed again next spring. Now the garden shed is full of large plastic boxes of nice clean frames put away so mice can't get at them.

Talking of mice - yesterday I attached mouse guards to all the hives. A mouse guard restricts the size of the entrance to the hive. It makes the entry smaller so it is easier for the bees to defend against any intruder - which at this time of year might be a mouse looking for a warm place to nest. We have never had a mouse in a hive thank goodness. While I was doing this a bee found the smallest of gaps between my bee suit and gloves and so I was given a big sting just to remind me that I was intruding too.

The bees need feeding at this time to make sure they have plenty of supplies to get them through to next spring. After the frames had come off the bees were fed a liquid solution which they take from a special feeder put on top of the brood box. They take this liquid into their brood box and turn it to a honey-like substance to feed off all winter.

Yesterday all the feeders came off and were replaced with special bee fondant blocks - these are to be very sure the bees have enough to eat till we have flowers again next spring. Also, a small dose of varroa medicine is introduced to help protect the hive against that disease.

Soon the bees will form into a ball. This bee ball will not fly during the winter

You are welcome to join Eccleshall Poetry Group at any time during the afternoon to find out which poems have been chosen for that afternoon's theme.




